Urban Voices Susan Lobo, 2002-12 California has always been America's promised land for American Indians as much as anyone. In the 1950s Native people from all over the United States moved to the San Francisco Bay Area as part of the Bureau of Indian Affairs Relocation Program. Oakland was a major destination of this program and once there Indian people arriving from rural and reservation areas had to adjust to urban living. They did it by creating a cooperative multi-tribal community, not a geographic community but rather a network of people linked by shared experiences and understandings. The Intertribal Friendship House in Oakland became a sanctuary during times of upheaval in people's lives and the heart of a vibrant American Indian community. As one long-time resident observes, "The Wednesday Night Dinner at the Friendship House was a must if you wanted to know what was happening among Native people." One of the oldest urban Indian organizations in the country, it continues to serve as a gathering place for newcomers as well as for the descendants of families who arrived half a century ago. This album of essays, photographs, stories, and art chronicles some of the people and events that have played and continue to play a role in the lives of Native families in the Bay Area Indian community over the past seventy years. Based on years of work by more than ninety individuals who have participated in the Bay Area Indian community and assembled by the Community History Project at the Intertribal Friendship House, it traces the community's changes from before and during the relocation period through the building of community institutions. It then offers insight into American Indian activism of the 1960s and 70s, including the occupation of Alcatraz, and shows how the Indian community continues to be created and re-created for future generations. Together, these perspectives weave a richly textured portrait that offers an extraordinary inside view of American Indian urban life. Through oral histories, written pieces prepared especially for this book, graphic images, and even news clippings, *Urban Voices* collects a bundle of memories that hold deep and rich meaning for those who are a part of the Bay Area Indian community, accounts that will be familiar to Indian people living in cities throughout the United States. And through this collection, non-Indians can gain a better understanding of Indian people in America today. If anything, this book is expressive of it: the insistence that Native people will be who they are, as Indians living in urban communities, Natives thriving as cultural people, strong in Indian ethnicity and Natives helping each other socially, spiritually, economically, and politically, no matter what. I lived in the Bay Area in 1975-79 and 1986-87, and I was always struck by the Native many people do say, "American Indian, emphatically, community and its cultural identity that has always insisted on being second to none." Yes, indeed, this book is a dynamic living document and a tribute to the Oakland Indian community as well as to the Bay Area Indian community as a whole. Simon J. Ortiz: When my family arrived in San Francisco in 1957, the people at the original San Francisco Indian Center helped us adjust to urban living. Many years later, I moved to Oakland, and the Intertribal Friendship House became my sanctuary during a tumultuous time in my life. The Intertribal Friendship House was more than an organization; it was the heart of a vibrant tribal community.

Thompson, 2005-02-15 In 1965 Dudley F Randall founded the Broadside Press a company devoted to publishing distributing and promoting the works of black poets and writers In so doing he became a major player in the civil rights movement Hundreds of black writers were given an outlet for their work and for their calls for equality and black identity Though Broadside was established on a minimal budget Randall's unique skills made the press successful He was trained as a librarian and had spent decades studying and writing poetry most importantly Randall was totally committed to the advancement of black literature The famous and relatively unknown sought out Broadside including such writers as Gwendolyn Brooks Margaret Walker Mae Jackson Lance Jeffers Etheridge Knight Sonia Sanchez Nikki Giovanni Audre Lorde and Sterling D Plumpp His story is one of battling to promote black identity and equality through literature and thus lifting the cultural lives of all Americans **Black Music, Black Poetry** Gordon E. Frankie and Johnny Stacy I. Morgan, 2017-04-18 Originating in a homicide in St Louis in 1899 the ballad of Frankie and Johnny became one of America's most familiar songs during the first half of the twentieth century It crossed lines of race class and artistic genres taking form in such varied expressions as a folk song performed by Huddie Ledbetter Lead Belly a ballet choreographed by Ruth Page and Bentley Stone under New Deal sponsorship a mural in the Missouri State Capitol by Thomas Hart Benton a play by John Huston a motion picture She Done Him Wrong that made Mae West a national celebrity and an anti lynching poem by Sterling Brown In this innovative book Stacy I Morgan explores why African American folklore and Frankie and Johnny in particular became prized source material for artists of diverse political and aesthetic sensibilities He looks at a confluence of factors including the Harlem Renaissance the Great Depression and resurgent nationalism that led those creators to engage with this ubiquitous song Morgan's research uncovers the wide range of work that artists called upon African American folklore to perform in the 1930s as it alternately reinforced and challenged norms of race gender and appropriate subjects for artistic expression He demonstrates that the folklorists and creative artists of that generation forged a new national culture in which African American folk songs featured centrally not only in folk and popular culture but in the fine arts as well

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
