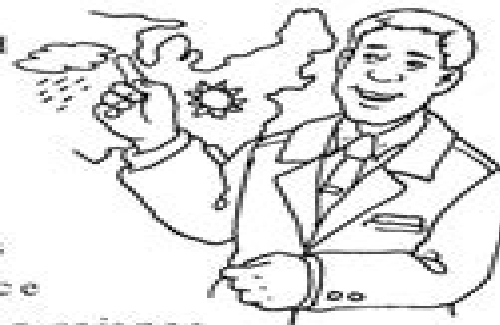
### Building Context
