I pp. 7-21 traces the Jewish presence in the state of New Mexico to the Spanish period when the region was colonized between 1598-1680. Persecuted by the Inquisition in colonial Mexico in the 1590s and 1640s, many Portuguese Conversos fled north to New Leon and New Mexico to seek refuge. States that until recently many New Mexican Hispanics have been unaware that they observe Jewish traditions. Some have complained of being called killers of Christ. The present Jewish population is composed mainly of descendants of German Jews who emigrated after 1846-48. In New Mexico, there were almost no manifestations of antisemitism apart from sporadic attacks against Jews, e.g., in 1867 in the press, which showed that personal politics or Jewish economic prominence could elicit latent antisemitism. In 1982, a controversy broke out about the use of the swastika and Nazi-like uniforms in the State University's yearbook, and in 1967 Reies Tijerina, a Christian fundamentalist, accused Jews of having stripped the Hispanics of their ancestral lands.

Remembering Our Grandfathers' Exile Gail Y. Okawa, 2020-08-31 When author Gail Okawa was in high school in Honolulu, a neighbor mentioned that her maternal grandfather had been imprisoned in a World War II concentration camp on the US mainland. Questioning her parents, she learned only that he came back a changed man. Years later, as an adult, salvaging that grandfather's memorabilia, she found a mysterious photo of a group of Japanese men standing in front of an

adobe building compelling her eventually to embark on a project to learn what happened to him Remembering Our Grandfathers Exile is a composite chronicling of the Hawai i Japanese immigrant experience in mainland exile and internment during World War II from pre war climate to arrest to exile to return Told through the eyes of a granddaughter and researcher born during the war it is also a research narrative that reveals parallels between pre WWII conditions and current twenty first century anti immigrant attitudes and heightened racism The book introduces Okawa s grandfather Reverend Tamasaku Watanabe a Protestant minister and other Issei prisoners all legal immigrants excluded by law from citizenship in a collective biographical narrative that depicts their suffering challenges and survival as highly literate men faced with captivity in the little known prison camps run by the U S Justice and War Departments Okawa interweaves documents personal and official and internees firsthand accounts letters and poetry to create a narrative that not only conveys their experience but equally important exemplifies their literacy as ironic and deliberate acts of resistance to oppressive conditions Her research revealed that the Hawai i Issei immigrants who had sons in military service were eventually distinguished from the main group the narrative relates visits of some of those sons to their imprisoned fathers in New Mexico and elsewhere as well as the deaths of sons killed in action in Europe and the Pacific Documents demonstrate the high degree of literacy and advocacy among the internees as well as the inherent injustice of the government s policies Okawa s project later expanded to include New Mexico residents having memories of the Santa Fe Internment Camp witnesses who provide rare views of the wartime reality *Advocates for the Oppressed* Malcolm Ebricht,2014-12 Having written about Hispano land grants and Pueblo Indian grants separately Malcolm Ebricht now brings these narratives together for the first time reconnecting them and resurrecting lost histories *Santa Fe* Elizabeth West,2012 This question and answer book contains 400 reminders of what is known and what is sometimes forgotten or misunderstood about a city that was founded more than 400 years ago Not a traditional history book this group of questions is presented in an apparently random order and the answers occasionally meander off topic as if part of a casual conversation *Land of Nuclear Enchantment* Lucie Genay,2019-04 Ground zero Land of cultural and economic survival The skeleton of a domestic nuclear empire The manifest destiny of atomic scientists The atomic sun shines over the desert The nuclear golden goose A federal sponsor Cloaked in secrecy Dangerous practices toxic legacies The sociocultural impacts of a scientific conquest Land lawsuits and waste Memory **Forty-Seventh Star** David Van Holtby,2012-09-28 New Mexico was ceded to the United States in 1848 at the end of the war with Mexico but not until 1912 did President William Howard Taft sign the proclamation that promoted New Mexico from territory to state Why did New Mexico s push for statehood last sixty four years Conventional wisdom has it that racism was solely to blame But this fresh look at the history finds a more complex set of obstacles tied primarily to self serving politicians Forty Seventh Star published in New Mexico s centennial year is the first book on its quest for statehood in more than forty years David V Holtby closely examines the final stretch of New Mexico s

Three Roads to Magdalena David Wallace Adams,2016-06-03 Someday Candelaria Garcia said to the author you will get all the stories It was a tall order in Magdalena New Mexico a once booming frontier town where Navajo Anglo and Hispanic people have lived in shifting sometimes separate sometimes overlapping worlds for well over a hundred years But these were the stories and this was the world that David Wallace Adams set out to

map in a work that would capture the intimate complex history of growing up in a Southwest borderland At the intersection of memory myth and history his book asks what it was like to be a child in a land of ethnic and cultural boundaries The answer as close to all the stories as one might hope to get captures the diverse ever changing experience of a Southwest community defined by cultural borders and the nature and role of children in defending and crossing those borders In this book we listen to the voices of elders who knew Magdalena nearly a century ago and the voices of a younger generation who negotiated the community s shifting boundaries Their stories take us to sheep and cattle ranches Navajo ceremonies Hispanic fiestas mining camps First Communion classes ranch house dances Indian boarding school drill fields high school social activities and children s rodeos Here we learn how class religion language and race influenced the creation of distinct identities and ethnic boundaries but also provided opportunities for cross cultural interactions and intimacies And we see the critical importance of education in both reinforcing differences and opening a shared space for those differences to be experienced and bridged In this Adams s work offers a close up view of the transformation of one multicultural community but also of the transformation of childhood itself over the course of the twentieth century A unique blend of oral social and childhood history *Three Roads to Magdalena* is a rare living document of conflict and accommodation across ethnic boundaries in our ever evolving multicultural society Published in Cooperation with the William P Clements Center for Southwest Studies Southern Methodist University
