Lesson:

1. Welcome students to the library.
2. Ask students "In the past, what has been your favorite part about coming to the library?"
 - a. Let them share for a few minutes.
3. Then ask them, "Why do you think I want you to come to the library?"
 - a. Let them share for a few minutes.
 - b. Together, create a Purpose Poster combining their ideas and your ideas such as listening to stories, talking about different books, doing fun activities, researching on the computer, etc.
4. Tell them, "Before you check out books, I need to make sure you know how to take care of our library books. Who remembers what to do or what NOT to do?"
 - a. Create a Book Care T-chart on another chart paper, and label the 2 columns "YES" and "NO". Let students share their ideas, and write them down under the correct column.

5. Read the story, The Shelf Elf.
6. After the story, go back to the chart and ask them if there were any ideas that the book talked about that we need to add to our chart.
 - a. Update the poster as needed.
