THE DIVING BELL SPIDER (WATER SPIDER)

Diving bell spiders are the only spider that can live underwater. Also known as a water spider, an air bubble helps the diving bell to survive underwater.

Physical Characteristics

A diving bell spider usually measures between 0.3 and 0.7 inches long. They are brown, black, or gray in color. The diving bell has tiny hairs on its body. Their hairs trap air, which then forms a bubble around the diving bell's abdomen.

Creating the Bell

Diving bell spiders start by spinning a curved web. The web attaches to an underwater plant. By using hairs on its body and hind legs, the diving bell traps air near the surface of the water. It brings the air bubble back to the web and releases the air bubble into the web. The air bubble will now be used to help the spider breathe underwater. The spider creates the bubble big enough so that it can fit inside.

Location

Diving bells generally live in Europe and Asia. They tend to stay in calm water, such as ponds and marshes. They can also be found in shallow lakes. A diving bell will use plants to form its web.

Living Inside the Bell

A diving bell spider spends most of its life inside its bell. If its bell begins to shrink, it will trap more air bubbles to bring to the bell to make it larger. They will also hunt insects to bring inside its bell to eat. A male diving bell spider will travel outside of the bell to hunt for its prey. However, a female will wait for her prey to come to her. During cold winters, diving bell spiders hibernate. They build strong bells that will provide enough oxygen for the cold winter months.



SAVING THE SEA TURTLES

Who doesn't love our hard-shelled friends that live in the sea? But are sea turtles safe? Many species of sea turtles are threatened and endangered due to environmental factors. What are those factors and how can we help?

What Can We Do?

There are many things you can do to help the sea turtle population starting with not polluting! Avoid using plastic if you can. If not, be sure to dispose of it properly. Try to protect marine life by staying away from corals when diving, not diving on sand beaches to protect eggs, and by not feeding marine animals. Help with beach cleaning projects and stand up for animal rights and organizations!

- Sea turtles are some of the oldest creatures on earth. Their fossils date back to 150 million years.
- Sea turtles travel many miles each year. Leatherback sea turtles can reach up to 30,000 miles a year!

Sea Turtle Dangers
There are many different factors that can affect the sea turtle species. Fisheries can endanger sea turtles by nets and longlines becoming entangled. Eventually, habitats and food webs will be destroyed.

Another danger to sea turtles is water pollution. Plastic and fishing gear are continuously being discarded into the ocean, causing sea turtles to ingest the harmful debris.

Building along coastal areas is another major concern. As more coastal areas become filled with homes and businesses, sea turtle habitats become greatly affected.
