



Walrus

Even though many walruses may tip the scales at over 2,000 pounds, they are **gentle giants**. Their size is big, but they are not mean! The walrus is a fluffy marine mammal that is covered by brown or pink skin. They have two small eyes, a mustache and two large tusks. Their tusks can grow to be over 3 feet long and may use them to break through the ice or to protect themselves from other walruses or predators. Walruses are considered carnivores (meat eaters), but they are not bold hunters. Their favorite food is shellfish. They dive down under the water and use their whiskers to find the shellfish. It has even been reported that a walrus can eat almost 4,000 clams in one feeding! Most walruses live in the cold Arctic waters and belong to a large group called a herd. During the day, you may see a large herd of walruses sunbathing on the ice or land together. Usually the males have a herd together and the females have a separate herd. Females give birth to their babies in spring. After 15–16 months of waiting, their calf is born. It will stay with its mother for up to 2 years! The female walrus will nurse its baby with milk and the milk will help the baby grow a more blubber. Blubber helps to protect the baby walrus from the freezing temperatures. In the 1950's, the whole walrus population was almost wiped out due to hunting. Now, the population is high and the walrus is safe!
