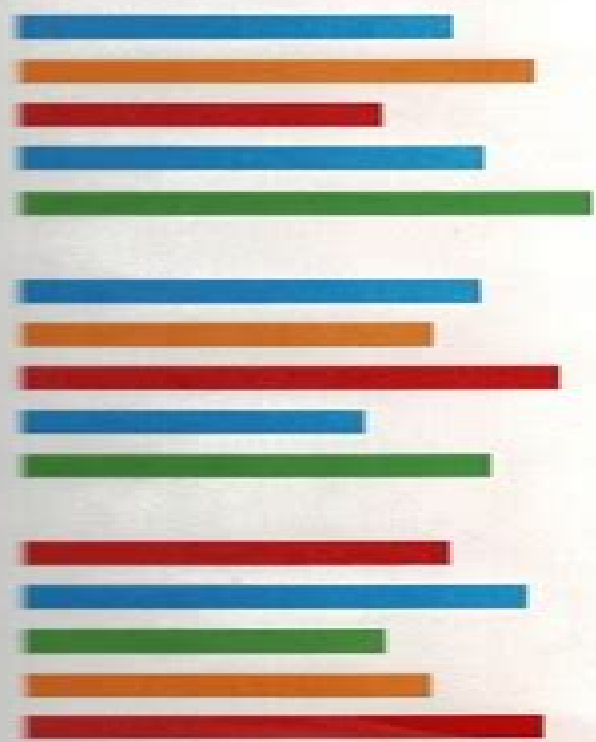


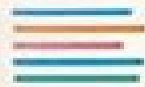

*The Sounds of Poetry* Robert Pinsky, 2025-08-22 The Poet Laureate's clear and entertaining account of how poetry works Poetry is a vocal which is to say a bodily art Robert Pinsky declares in *The Sounds of Poetry* The medium of poetry is the human body the column of air inside the chest shaped into signifying sounds in the larynx and the mouth In this sense poetry is as physical or bodily an art as dancing As Poet Laureate Pinsky is one of America's best spokesmen for poetry In this fascinating book he explains how poets use the technology of poetry its sounds to create works of art that are performed in us when we read them aloud He devotes brief informative chapters to accent and duration syntax and line like and unlike sounds blank and free verse He cites examples from the work of fifty different poets from Shakespeare Donne and Herbert to W C Williams Frost Elizabeth Bishop C K Williams Louise Gluck and Frank Bidart This ideal introductory volume belongs in the library of every poet and student of poetry
