South Africa's Post-Apartheid Military Lindy Heinecken, 2020-01-01 This timely book examines how the South African National Defence Force has adapted to the country's new security political and social environment since 1994. In South Africa's changed political state, how has civilian control of the military been implemented and what does this mean for defence in a democracy? This book presents an overview of the security environment, how the mission focus of the military has changed and the implications for force procurement, force preparation, force employment and force sustainability.
