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Why Art Photography? Viewing Photography in Post-Dictatorship Latin America David Rojinsky, 2022-11-30 This book examines the archival aesthetic of mourning and memory developed by Latin American artists and photographers between 1997 2016 Particular attention is paid to how photographs of the assassinated or disappeared political dissident of the 1970s and 1980s as found in family albums and in official archives were not only reimagined as conduits for private mourning but also became allegories of social trauma and the struggle against socio political amnesia Memorials art installations photo essays street projections and documentary films are all considered as media for the reframing of these archival images from the era of the Cold War dictatorships in Argentina Chile Guatemala and Uruguay While the turn of the millennium was supposedly marked by the end of history and with the advent of digital technologies by the end of photography these works served to interrupt and hence belie the dominant narrative on both counts Indeed the book's overarching contention is that the viewer's affective identification with distant suffering when engaging these artworks is equally interrupted instead the viewer is invited to apprehend memorial images as emblems of national and international histories of ideological struggle

Image Studies Sunil Manghani, 2013 Image Studies provides an engaging introduction to visual studies analysis and an account of existing and emergent visual culture debates along with chapters on a range of topics including consumer culture and identity photography and digital imaging painting and drawing the moving image the relationship between image and text including reference to text in art comics and animation and scientific imaging Written in an engaging and accessible way the text will also include extracts of existing critical materials Each chapter will include key set readings including short extracts from existing literatures with accompanying study notes and questions The

chapters will also include a range of critical and creative tasks designed to bring the academic study of visual culture into direct contact with practical aspects of visual culture and image making Image Studies is a new text aimed predominantly at undergraduate students in visual culture but which will also be useful for media studies students and arts students more generally Self-Representation in an Expanded Field Ace Lehner, 2021-05-31 Defined as a self image made with a hand held mobile device and shared via social media platforms the selfie has facilitated self imaging becoming a ubiquitous part of globally networked contemporary life Beyond this selfies have facilitated a diversity of image making practices and enabled otherwise representationally marginalized constituencies to insert self representations into visual culture In the Western European and North American art historical context self portraiture has been somewhat rigidly albeit obliquely defined and selfies have facilitated a shift regarding who literally holds the power to self image Like self portraits not all selfies are inherently aesthetically or conceptually rigorous or avant guard But as this project aims to do address via a variety of interdisciplinary approaches selfies have irreversibly impacted visual culture contemporary art and portraiture in particular Selfies propose new modes of self imaging forward emerging aesthetics and challenge established methods they prove that as scholars and image makers it is necessary to adapt and innovate in order to contend with the most current form of self representation to date The essays gathered herein will reveal that in our current moment it is necessary and advantageous to consider the merits and interventions of selfies and self portraiture in an expanded field of self representations We invite authors to take interdisciplinary global perspectives to investigate various sub genres aesthetic practices and lineages in which selfies intervene to enrich the discourse on self representation in the expanded field today **Nonhuman**

Photography Joanna Zylińska, 2024-07-02 A new philosophy of photography that goes beyond humanist concepts to consider imaging practices from which the human is absent as both subject and agent Today in the age of CCTV drones medical body scans and satellite images photography is increasingly decoupled from human agency and human vision In Nonhuman Photography Joanna Zylińska offers a new philosophy of photography going beyond the human centric view to consider imaging practices from which the human is absent Zylińska argues further that even those images produced by humans whether artists or amateurs entail a nonhuman mechanical element that is they involve the execution of technical and cultural algorithms that shape our image making devices as well as our viewing practices At the same time she notes photography is increasingly mobilized to document the precariousness of the human habitat and tasked with helping us imagine a better tomorrow With its conjoined human nonhuman agency and vision Zylińska claims photography functions as both a form of control and a life shaping force Zylińska explores the potential of photography for developing new modes of seeing and imagining and presents images from her own photographic project Active Perceptual Systems She also examines the challenges posed by digitization to established notions of art culture and the media In connecting biological extinction and technical obsolescence and discussing the parallels between photography and fossilization she proposes to understand

photography as a light induced process of fossilization across media and across time scales
