Cutler, 2015-05-01 Who holds ultimate authority for the education of America s children teachers or parents Although the relationship between home and school has changed dramatically over the decades William Cutler s fascinating history argues that it has always been a political one and his book uncovers for the

first time how and why the balance of power has shifted over time Starting with parental dominance in the mid nineteenth century Cutler chronicles how schools growing bureaucratization and professionalization allowed educators to gain increasing control over the schooling and lives of the children they taught Central to his story is the role of parent teacher associations which helped transform an adversarial relationship into a collaborative one Yet parents have also been controlled by educators through PTAs leading to the perception that they are company unions Cutler shows how in the 1920s and 1930s schools expanded their responsibility for children s well being outside the classroom These efforts sowed the seeds for later conflict as schools came to be held accountable for solving society s problems Finally he brings the reader into recent decades in which a breakdown of trust racial tension and parents rights have taken the story full circle with parents and schools once again at odds Cutler s book is an invaluable guide to understanding how parent teacher cooperation which is essential for our children s educational success might be achieved *Resources in Education* ,2001 [A Class Apart](#) Alec Klein,2007-08-21 Enter Stuyvesant High one of the most extraordinary schools in America a place where the brainiacs prevail and jocks are embarrassed to admit they play on the woeful football team Academic competition is so intense that students say they can have only two of these three things good grades a social life or sleep About one in four Stuyvesant students gains admission to the Ivy League And the school s alumni include several Nobel laureates Academy Award winners and luminaries in the arts business and public service A Class Apart follows the lives of Stuyvesant s remarkable students such as Romeo the football team captain who teaches himself calculus and strives to make it into Harvard Jane a world weary poet at seventeen battling the demon of drug addiction Milo a ten year old prodigy trying to fit in among high school students who are literally twice his size Mariya a first generation American beginning to resist parental pressure for ever higher grades so that she can enjoy her sophomore year And then there is the faculty such as math chairman Mr Jaye who is determined not to let bureaucratic red tape stop him from helping his teachers He even finds a job for a depressed math genius who lacks a college degree but possesses the gift of teaching This is the story of the American dream a New York City school that inspires immigrants to come to these shores so that their children can attend Stuyvesant in the first step to a better life It s also the controversial story of elitism in education Stuyvesant is a public school but children must pass a rigorous entrance exam to get in Only about 3 percent do so which Stuyvesant students and faculty point out makes admission to their high school tougher than to Harvard On the eve of the hundredth anniversary of Stuyvesant s first graduating class reporter Alec Klein an alumnus was given unfettered access to the school and the students and faculty who inhabit it What emerges is a book filled with stunning raw and heartrending personalities whose stories are hilarious sad and powerfully moving **Atoms, Bombs and Eskimo Kisses: A Memoir of Father and Son** Claudio G. Segrè,2019-08-09 There are few books that explore the complex relations between famous parents and their children I knew Claudio and his Nobel laureate father Emilio Segr in this honest angry loving memoir I hear their voices again speaking across the gulf that all families struggle to bridge Richard

Rhodes author of *Dark Sun: The Making of the Hydrogen Bomb* This is a warm and openhearted book Claudio Segr shows that all the traditional tensions between fathers and sons can still exist even in the extraordinary milieu he grew up in He evokes that experience with grace and a fine eye for the telling details Adam Hochschild author of *Half the Way Home* It's a wonderful book a coming of age story in the atomic era the struggle of a son for the love and respect of a famous father It is also a perceptive insight into the pursuit of science the price of fame and how families bridge differences between generations and cultures to find age old connections and ultimately love and understanding James Kunetka author of *City of Fire: Los Alamos and the Atomic Age* and *Oppenheimer: The Years of Risk* The Nobel Prize winning physicist Emilio Segr gave an account of his own life in the posthumously published *A Mind Always in Motion* In the present book Segr's only son now himself deceased gives an account of his growing up with such a father The experience as he describes it was not an easy one Transported in infancy from Italy to the United States Claudio was required to negotiate his way between his family's persistent conviction of European cultural superiority and the danger of being perceived as not one of us by his new compatriots Admiring his father he was conscious of himself as Son of Superman alternatively feeling eclipsed by and relishing the position Academically he was beset by a joyless desire to achieve and only seldom gained the praise or sympathy he longed for from his exacting and often sarcastic father But he discovered the delights of hot dogs comic books and baseball and forged ahead on his own by choosing the reputedly Red Reed College over his family's preferred Berkeley After graduation in search of work to which he could be as devoted as my father was to physics he spent some years as a journalist before ultimately making a creditable academic career as a historian along the way establishing an apparently satisfactory family life of his own The book ends with an account of his relations with his father as an adult including a disappointing attempt at a therapeutic confrontation Katherine Livingston *Science* How does a son emerge from his father's shadow when it is the size of a mushroom cloud Such was the plight of Claudio G Segr whose father Emilio won the Nobel Prize in Physics in 1959 and helped to create the atomic bomb He recounts his lifelong quest to establish an independent identity He also tells of his hope that his own success would earn him the respect and acceptance of his difficult father Segr alternately describes his father as Superman a mighty king and a basilisk a mythical reptile whose very look is fatal Nevertheless his father emerges as a good caring man unsure how to handle the fame that separates him from his son It is tragic therefore that no true reconciliation occurs and that Segr's only moment of catharsis takes place when it is already too late in 1989 when he delivers his father's eulogy Douglas A Sylva *The New York Times* In this heartfelt counterpart to his father's autobiography *A Mind Always in Motion* journalist and professor Claudio Segr attempts to shed some thawing light on the cold peace between father and son that lasted until Emilio Segr's death in 1989 despite the affectionate nose rubbings of the title Publishers Weekly The son of a Nobel laureate and Manhattan Project collaborator meditates on the inspirations and disappointments of a difficult relationship In 1959 the author's father shared the Nobel Prize for his work on antimatter

But fatherhood isn't as precise a science as physics and young Claudio mixed pride in his father's superman achievements with frustration and rage at the impossible standards and criticisms that so outweighed the occasional moment of affection between them. Segr's memoir of an immigrant childhood is often poignant at bottom a thoughtful account of life with a father who found the behavior of atomic particles far easier to comprehend than the emotional life of his son.
