Laird argues to the contrary that if feelings are information about behaviors that are already ongoing feelings cannot be causes and that the whole mechanistic model of human behavior as caused in this sense seems mistaken He proposes an alternative cybernetic model involving hierarchically stacked control systems In this model feelings provide feedback to the control systems and in a further elaboration this model suggests that the stack of control systems matches a similar stack of levels of organization of the world An original contribution to the study of the relationship between feelings and behavior the volume will be of interest to social emotional and cognitive psychologists
