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The Art of Indirection in British Espionage Fiction Robert Lance Snyder, 2011-07-25 In contrast to the classical detective story the spy novel tends to be considered a suspect somewhat subversive genre While previous studies have focused on its historical thematic and ideological dimensions this critical work examines British espionage fiction s unique narrative form which is typically elliptical oblique and recursive Featured works include eighteen novels by Eric Ambler Graham Greene Len Deighton John le Carre Stella Rimington and Charles Cumming most of which exemplify the existential or serious spy thriller Half of these texts pertain to the Cold War era and the other half to its aftermath in the so called Age of Terrorism

Empires of Print Patrick Scott Belk, 2017-05-08 At the turn of the twentieth century the publishing industries in Britain and the United States underwent dramatic expansions and reorganization that brought about an increased traffic in books and periodicals around the world Focusing on adventure fiction published from 1899 to 1919 Patrick Scott Belk looks at authors such as Joseph Conrad H G Wells Conan Doyle and John Buchan to explore how writers of popular fiction engaged with foreign markets and readers through periodical publishing Belk argues that popular fiction particularly the adventure genre developed in ways that directly correlate with authors experiences and shows that popular genres of the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries emerged as one way of marketing their literary works to expanding audiences of readers worldwide Despite an over determined print space altered by the rise of new kinds of consumers and transformations of accepted habits of reading publishing and writing the changes in British and American publishing at the turn of the twentieth century inspired an exciting new period of literary invention and experimentation in the adventure genre and the greater part of that invention and experimentation was happening in the magazines

Haig and Kitchener in Twentieth-Century Britain Stephen Heathorn, 2016-04-22 Lord Kitchener and Lord Haig are two monumental figures of the First World War Their reputations both in their lifetimes and after their deaths have been attacked and defended scrutinized and contested They have been depicted in film print and public memorials in Britain and the wider world and new biographies of both men appear to this day The material representations of Haig and Kitchener were shaped

used and manipulated for official and popular ends by a variety of groups at different times during the twentieth century The purpose of this study is not to discover the real individual nor to attack or defend their reputations rather it is an exploration of how both men have been depicted since their deaths and to consider what this tells us about the nature and meaning of First World War commemoration While Haig s representation was more contested before the Second World War than was Kitchener s with several constituencies trying to fashion and use Haig s memory the Government the British Legion ex servicemen themselves and bereaved families it was probably less contested but overwhelmingly more negative than Kitchener s after the Second World War The book sheds light on the notion of heroic masculinity questioning in particular the degree to which the image of the common soldier replaced that of the high commander in the popular imagination and explores how the military heritage in the twentieth century came into collision with the culture of modernity It also contributes to ongoing debates in British historiography and to the larger debates over the social construction of memory the problematic relation between what is considered heritage and history and the need for historians to be sensitive and attentive to the interconnections between heritage and history and their contexts Violent Femmes Rosie

Betrayal has a deep fascination It captures our imagination in part because we have all betrayed or been betrayed in small or large ways Despite this there has been little serious work on the subject It was this absence that inspired this book As Akerstrom notes betrayal is something that most people have encountered at some point in their lives She defines betrayal as a breach of trust when information is shared beyond an agreed upon boundary of relations whether that boundary is a pair of friends or a nation Taking as a point of departure Simmers work on secrets and secrecy Akerstrom discusses categories of betrayal and conditions that influence its intensity Sometimes the betrayer is seen as a hero and at other times a traitor and sometimes there are competing loyalties In certain situations she reminds us it is difficult to avoid betrayal or the perception
