## UNIT 1 - Foundations

### 1. I can describe the basic ideas of the Declaration of Independence.

- Announced the separation of 13 North American British colonies from Great Britain
- It asserts that all men are created equal and are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable rights, including life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness
- The main business of the government is to protect these rights
- If a government tries to withhold these rights, the people are free to revolt and to set up a new government (The document emphasizes how tyranny is bad and not tolerated here)
- The Declaration justified the independence of the United States by listing colonial grievances against King George III and by asserting certain natural and legal rights, including a right of revolution

### 2. I can describe the basic ideas of the US Constitution.

- The U.S. Constitution established America's national government, fundamental laws, and guaranteed certain basic rights for its citizens
- It introduced the doctrine of separation of powers into three branches—executive, legislative, and judicial—along with a system of checks and balances to ensure no single branch would have too much power
- The Constitution embodies six big ideas: limited government, republicanism, checks and balances, federalism, separation of powers, and popular sovereignty
- Limited government means the government can only do what the people allow it to do
- Popular sovereignty asserts that the people are the source of any and all governmental power

### 3. I know the basic ideas of the Bill of Rights (know each separately) and the 13-19 Amendments. (NOT GOING TO BE TESTED ON NUMBERS)

1. Freedom of religion, speech, press, assembly, and petition
2. The right to bear arms
3. Protection from quartering of soldiers in homes
4. Protection from unreasonable searches and seizures
5. Rights in criminal cases, including protection against double jeopardy and self-incrimination
6. Right to a fair trial
7. Right to a trial by jury
8. Protection from cruel and unusual punishment
9. Protection of rights not specifically mentioned in the Constitution
10. Powers not delegated to the U.S. by the Constitution, are reserved to the States or to the people
11. Establishes the principle of state sovereign immunity
12. Repeals and revises presidential election procedures established in the original Constitution
13. Outlaws slavery
14. Grants citizenship and equal civil and legal rights to African Americans and slaves who were emancipated after the American Civil War
15. Guarantees that the right to vote cannot be denied based on "race, color, or previous condition of servitude"
16. Permits a federal income tax
17. Provides for the direct election of U.S. senators by the voters of the states
18. Imposes the federal prohibition of alcohol
19. Extends to women the right to vote
