What Is Cinema Vol 1 Andre Bazin:

What Is Cinema? André Bazin, 2005 The first of two volumes this book has been a classic of film studies for as long as it has been available and is considered the gold standard in the field of film criticism *Cahiers Du Cinéma, the 1950s* Jim Hillier, 1985 The Cahiers du Cinéma has played a major role in establishing film theory and criticism as an essential part of the late 20th century culture This volume contains articles from the 1950s *André Bazin's Film Theory* Angela Dalle Vacche, 2020 Through metaphors and allusions to art science and religion André Bazin's writings on the cinema explore a simple yet profound question what is a human For the famous French film critic a human is simultaneously a rational animal and an irrational being Bazin's idea of the cinema is a mind machine where the ethical implications have priority over aesthetic issues And in its ability to function as an art form for the masses cinema is the only medium that can address an audience at the individual and community levels simultaneously the audience sees the same film but each individual relates to the narrative in a different way In principle cinema can unsettle our routines in productive ways and expand our sense of belonging to a much larger picture By arguing that this dissident Catholic's worldview is anti anthropocentric Angela Dalle Vacche concludes that André Bazin's idea of the cinema recapitulates the histories of biological evolution and modern technology inside our consciousness Through the projection of recorded traces of the world onto a brain like screen the cinema can open viewers up to self interrogation and empathy towards Otherness Bazin was neither a spiritualist nor an animist or a pantheist yet his film theory leads also to ideas of a more cosmological persuasion through editing and camera movement cinema explores our belonging to a vast universe that extends from the microbes of the microscope to the stars of the telescope Such ideas of connectedness coupled with Bazin's well known emphasis of realism form the foundation for his film theory's embrace of Italian neorealism Choosing to avoid a quantitative naturalism based on accumulation of details Bazin's theory instead promotes the kind of cinema that celebrates perceptual displacement the objectification of human behavior and one's own critical self awareness **Collecting Visible Evidence** Jane Gaines, Michael Renov, 1999 In documentary studies the old distinctions between fiction and nonfiction no longer apply as contemporary film and video artists produce works that defy classification Coming together to make sense of these developments the contributors to this book effectively redefine documentary studies They trace the documentary impulse in the early detective camera in the reenactment of battle scenes from World War I and in the telecast of the Nevada A bomb test in 1952 Other topics include experiments in virtual reality the crisis of representation in anthropology and video art and documentary work that challenge the asymmetry of the postcolonial us them divide Book jacket *The Visual Turn* Angela Dalle Vacche, 2003 This collection of essays demonstrates the usefulness of looking at cinema with the analytical methods provided by art theory The Visual Turn is a dialogue between art historians and film theorists from the silent period to the aftermath of World War II

considers the collaboration between Rossellini and Ingrid Bergman in light of the neorealist aesthetic re-examining the director's immediate postwar works in relation to the contemporary discussion on Italian national identity **The Art of Pure Cinema** Bruce Isaacs, 2020 In a now famous interview with François Truffaut in 1962 Alfred Hitchcock described his masterpiece Rear Window 1954 as the purest expression of a cinematic idea But what precisely did Hitchcock mean by pure cinema Was pure cinema a function of mise en scène or composition within the frame Was it a function of montage of pieces of film assembled This notion of pure cinema has intrigued and perplexed critics theorists and filmmakers alike in the decades following this discussion And even across his 40 year career Hitchcock's own ideas about pure cinema remained mired in a lack of detail clarity and analytical precision The Art of Pure Cinema is the first book-length study to examine the historical foundations and stylistic mechanics of pure cinema Author Bruce Isaacs explores the potential of a philosophical and artistic approach most explicitly demonstrated by Hitchcock in his later films beginning with Hitchcock's contact with the European avant-garde film movement in the mid 1920s Tracing the evolution of a philosophy of pure cinema across

Hitchcock's most experimental works *Rear Window* *Vertigo* *North by Northwest* *Psycho* *The Birds* *Marnie* and *Frenzy* Isaacs rereads these works in a new and vital context In addition to this historical account the book presents the first examination of pure cinema as an integrated stylistics of mise en scène montage and sound design The films of so called Hitchcockian imitators like Mario Bava Dario Argento and Brian De Palma are also examined in light of a provocative claim that the art of pure cinema is only fully realized after Hitchcock

Narrative Mortality Catherine Russell, 1995 Analyzes New Wave cinema from a postmodern perspective What seems like closure might be something more as Catherine Russell shows us in this book about death in narrative cinema since the 1950s Analyzing the structural importance of death in narrative endings as well as the thematics of loss and redemption Russell identifies mortality as a valuable critical tool for understanding the cinema of the second half of the twentieth century Her work includes close textual readings of films by Fritz Lang Wim Wenders Oshima Nagisa Jean Luc Godard and Robert Altman among others In these analyses Russell reveals an uneasy relationship between death and closure which she traces to anxieties about identity gender and national cultural myths as well as to the persistence of desire Drawing on the work of Walter Benjamin she shows us death as a fundamentally allegorical structure in cinema and as a potential sign of historical difference with crucial implications for theories of film narrative and spectatorship *Narrative Mortality* provides fresh insight into the dynamics of postmodern cinema as it emerged from the modernist preoccupation with existential mortality By tracing the role of death from a work that precedes the Brechtian cinema of the 1960s *Beyond a Reasonable Doubt* to several that succeed it *Nashville* *The State of Things* the book expands the narrative project of New Wave cinema and ushers it onto a broader historical plane
