newspapers and pamphlets read in the 1700s books are rarely seen as shaping or keeping modern time However as Lupton demonstrates books are often put down and picked up they are leafed through as well as read sequentially and they are handed on as objects designed to bridge temporal distances In showing how discourse itself engages with these material practices Lupton argues that reading is something to be studied textually as well as historically Applying modern theorists such as Niklas Luhmann Bruno Latour and Bernard Stiegler Lupton offers a rare phenomenological approach to the study of a concrete historical field This compelling book stands out for the combination of archival research smart theoretical inquiry and autobiographical reflection it brings into play
