The Long Green Shore John Hepworth, 2014-03-26 Written in 1947 but not published until 1995 John Hepworth's debut novel is a gripping account of Australian soldiers fighting in New Guinea at the end of World War II. The product of Hepworth's own experience, *The Long Green Shore* recounts the lives and deaths of a group of soldiers battling the Japanese in the rain-soaked jungle. In sublime prose it captures the terror and the monotony of war. On its publication *The Long Green Shore* was met with immediate critical acclaim. It was recognised as one of the world's great war novels. John Hepworth was born in 1921 and lived in Melbourne. A journalist, author, playwright, and poet, he is well remembered for his contribution to the *Nation* Review in the 1970s and for his work at the ABC. He wrote many books, some co-authored with Bob Ellis and others illustrated by Michael Leunig. He died in 1995 soon after learning that *The Long Green Shore* would finally be published.
